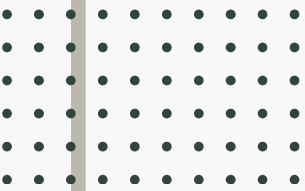

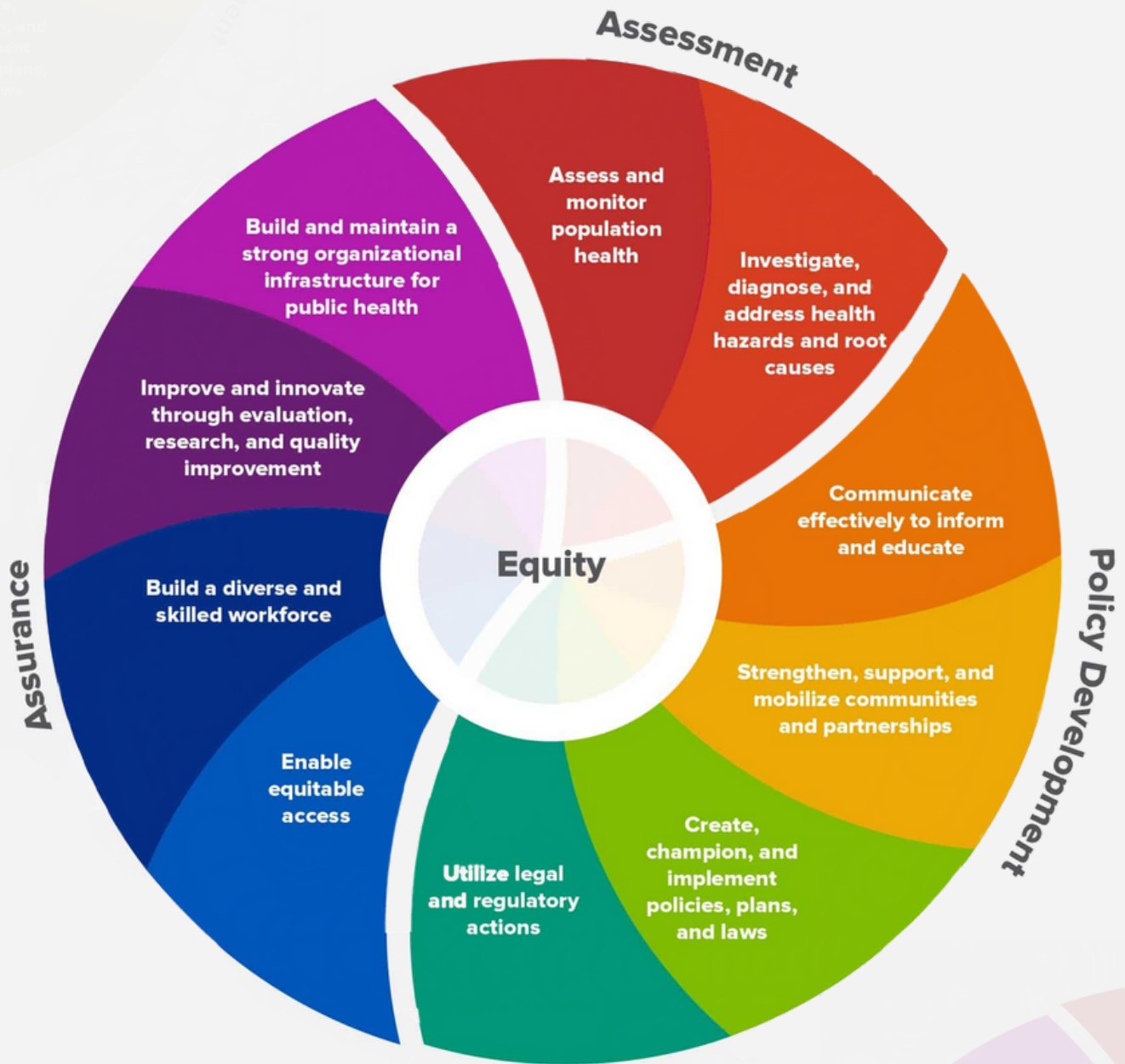

Mental Health By the Numbers

Among U.S. Adults:

- 1 in 5 experienced a mental illness
- 1 in 20 experienced a serious mental illness

Frequency of Mental Health ED Visits, ELC Catchment 01/22-12-22

15% of adults had a substance use disorder in the past year. 93.5% did not receive treatment.

The age group **10-17** had the most suicide attempt ED visits.

320 people who live in the ELC catchment area visited an Emergency Department for suicidal ideation.

According to a 2023 Mental Health America report, Kansas ranked 53/51, which indicates higher prevalence of mental illness and lower rates of access to care. The overall ranking includes both adult and youth measures, as well as prevalence and access to care measures.

16% of youth report suffering from at least one major depressive episode in the past year.

Coverage level of 4 doses of Tdap vaccine in children by age 2 years



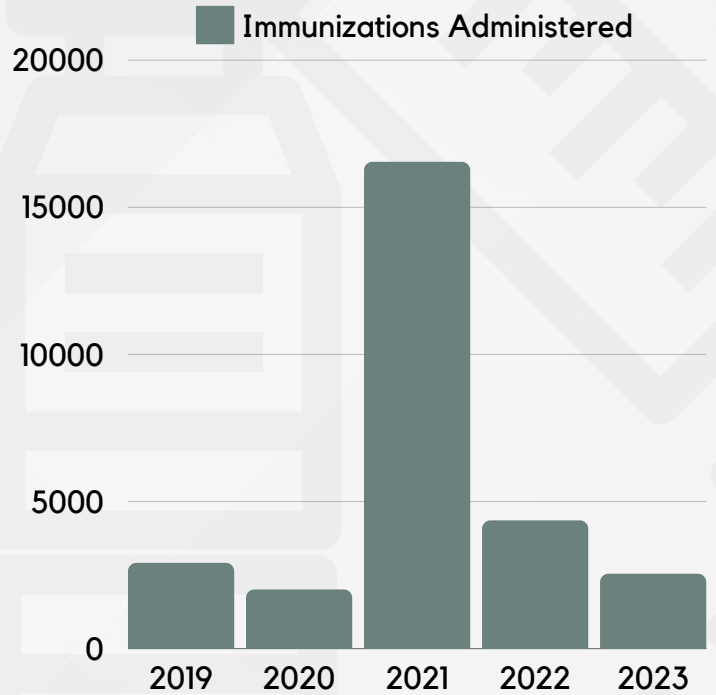

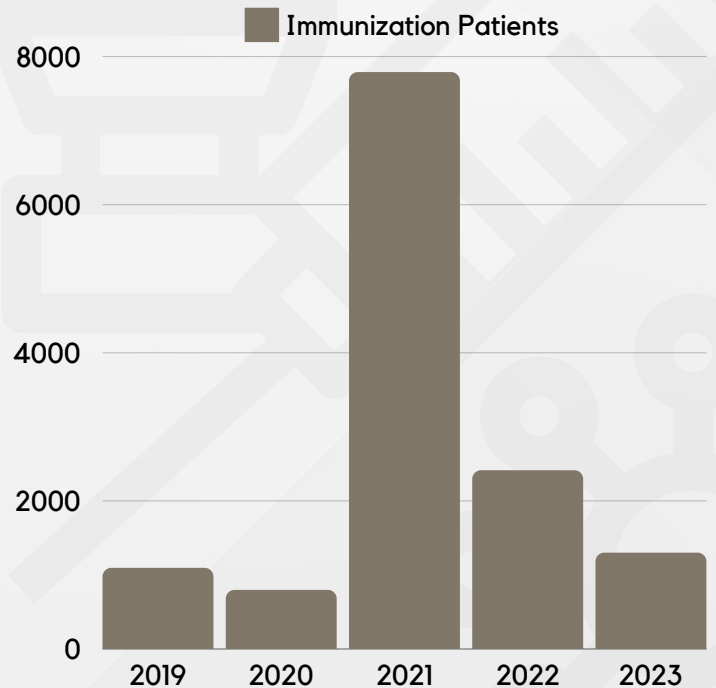

In addition to processing specimens in-house or sending them off to LabCorp, Miami County Health Department continues to utilize the services provided by Kansas Department of Health and Environment Laboratory (KHEL) for certain specimens.

Furthermore, MCHD serves as a central location for city and rural water officials in Miami County to drop off water samples sent to the state for testing.

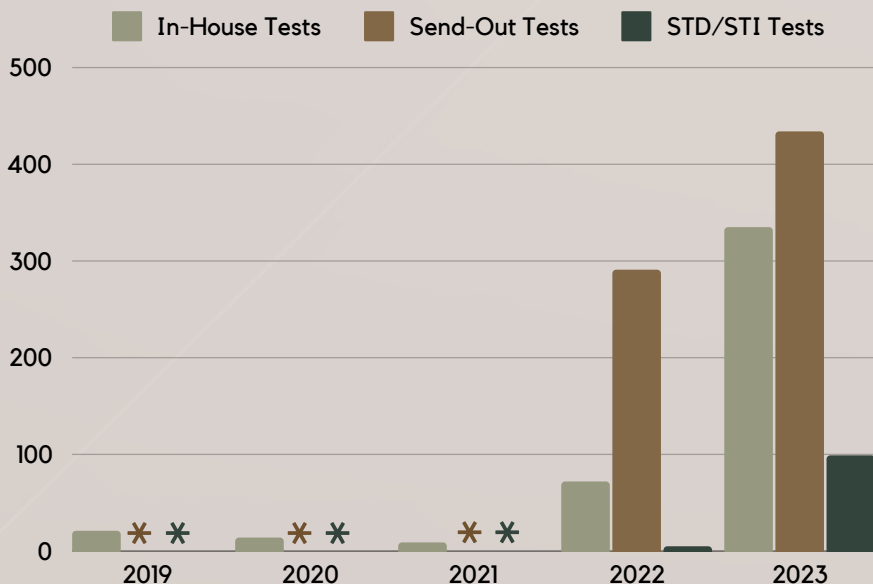

EPIDEMIOLOGY

Disease Investigation & Containment

In 2023, our epidemiology staff remained steadfast in their mission to prevent and control the spread of infectious diseases. It was an ongoing effort to monitor the incidence of reportable communicable diseases, conduct timely case investigations, and to perform thorough contact tracing to those affected. When requested, staff provided best-practice recommendations to community partners serving high-risk and vulnerable populations and education regarding rabies, latent tuberculosis, and more.

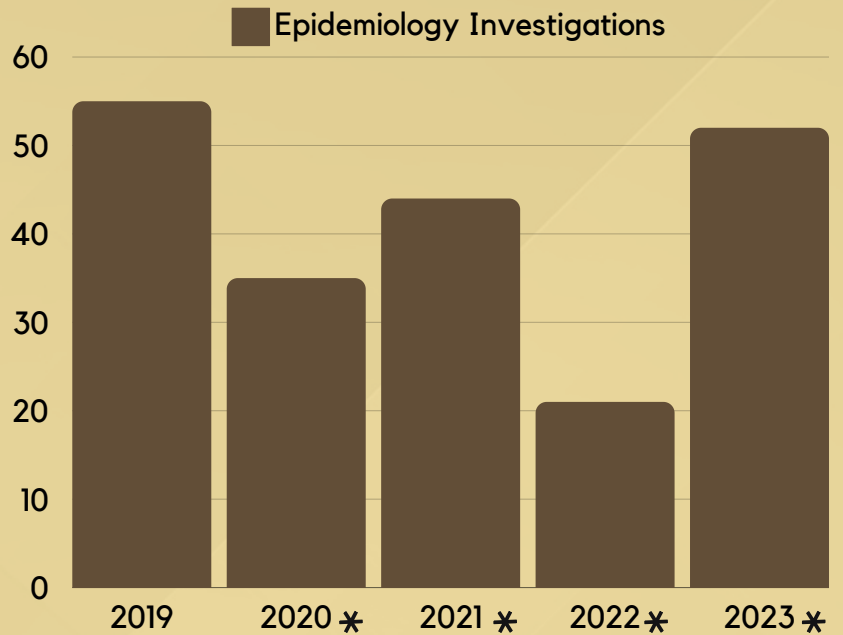

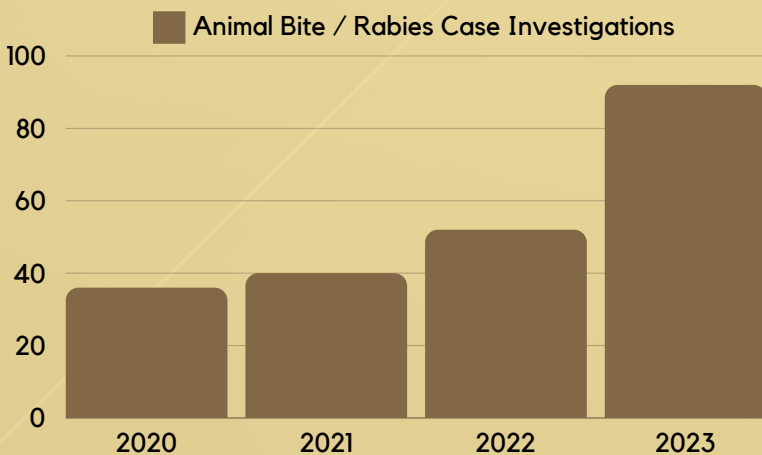

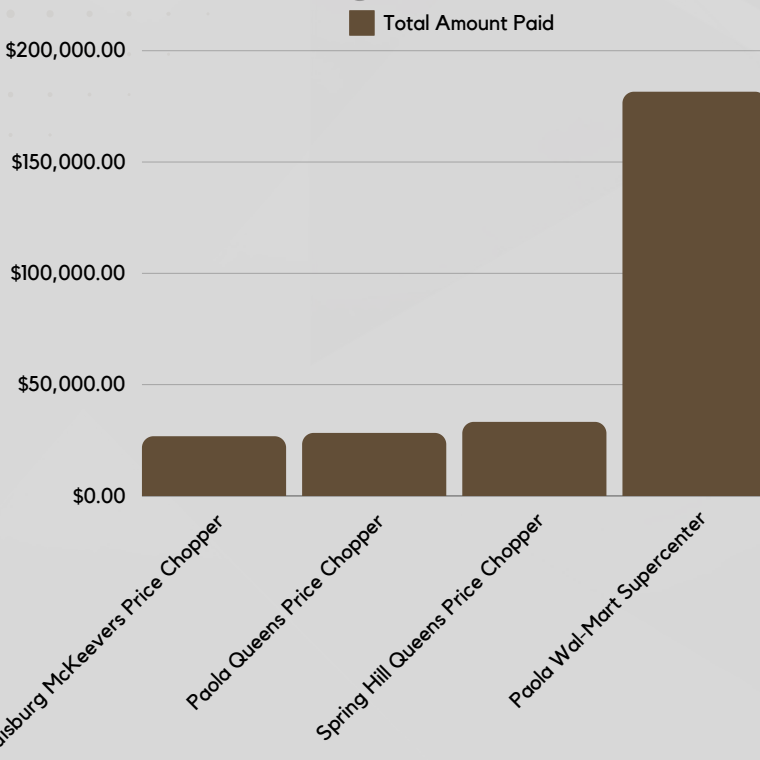

Home visitors provide support, education, initiate referrals, and assist mothers and families in accessing care and improving childhood health and development.

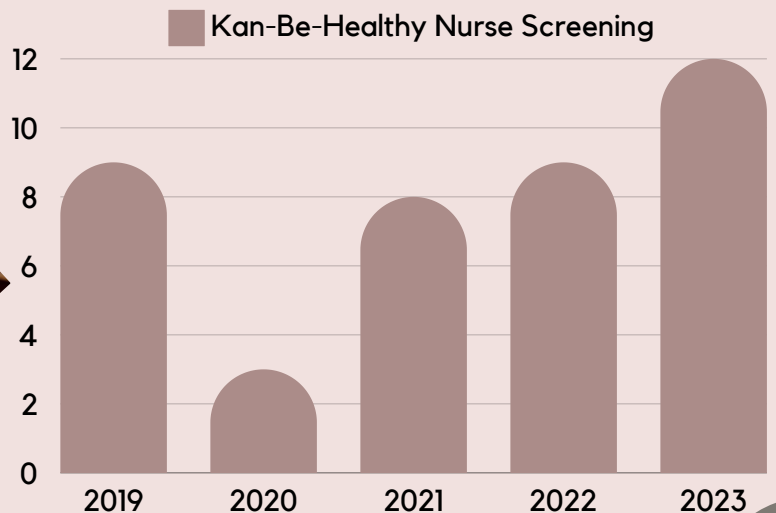

Kan-Be-Healthy (KBH) screenings provide preventative health care services to individuals up to the age of 21, who are enrolled in Kansas Medicaid.

With KBH exams, our nurses are able to conduct age-specific screenings for vision, dental, hearing, and medical.

A Year-Over-Year Analysis of Kan-Be-Healthy Screenings Performed



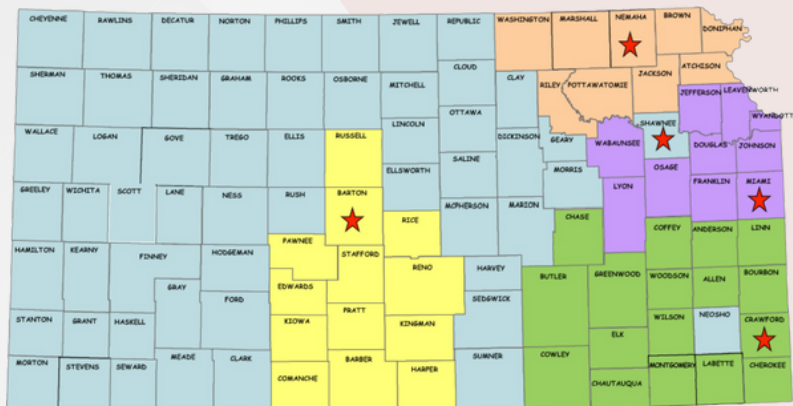
MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH

Special Health Care Needs (SHCN)

Miami County Health Department is the site coordinator for ten counties in the state of Kansas, four of which are ranked in the top 10 for highest population.

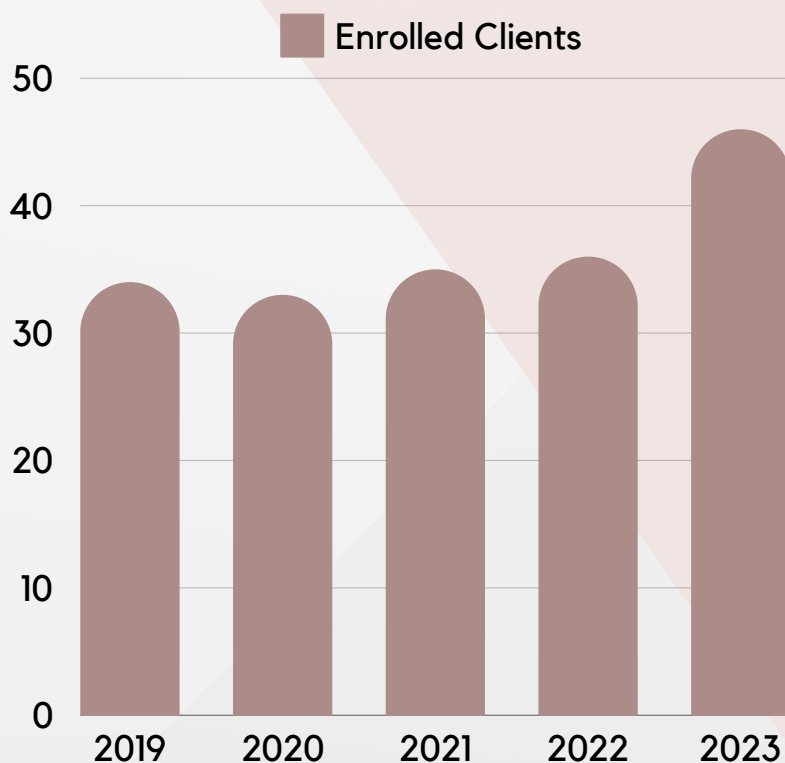


At the end of 2023, there were a total of 218 enrolled clients in the SHCN program throughout the state.

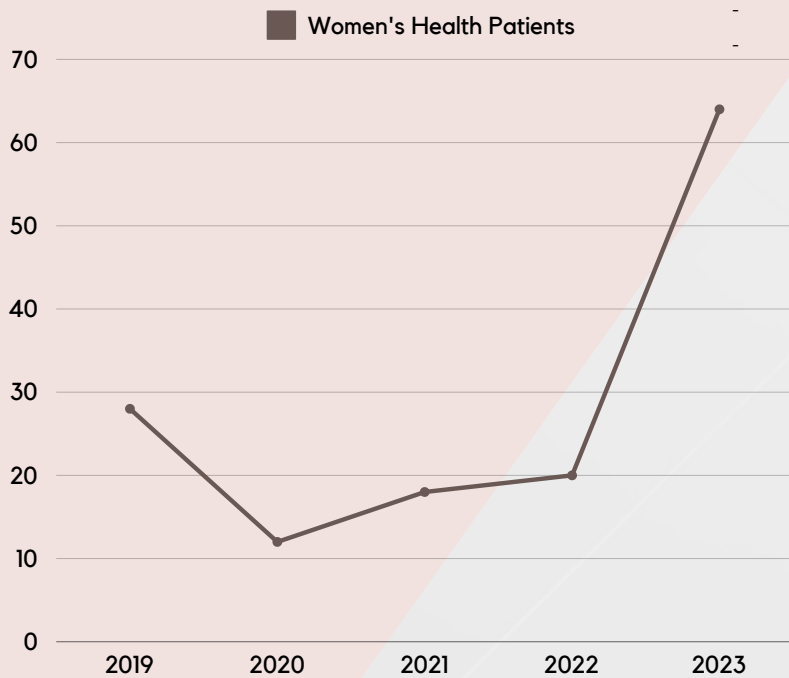

Care Resource Coordination (CRC)

With the inception of our care resource coordination program in 2020 amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, MCHD has been able to collaboratively assess the immediate and long-term needs of individuals and families, aiming to improve access and connections to care.

Community Health Worker

In partnership with the Community Health Council, we proudly host a Community Health Worker, Carla Moralez. Community Health Workers serve as a liaison between health and social services and the community to help improve access to quality care. They are tailored to meet the needs of the communities they serve.

Carla is a bilingual Maternal Community Health Worker who focuses on the maternal population by helping individuals and families navigate healthcare systems and by providing education, resources, and referrals.

Carla is a Certified Car Seat Technician, Safe Sleep Instructor, and can provide Becoming-a-Mom classes, Home Health Aide training, Chronic Disease Self-Management training and education, and is certified to provide the National Diabetes Prevention Program training.

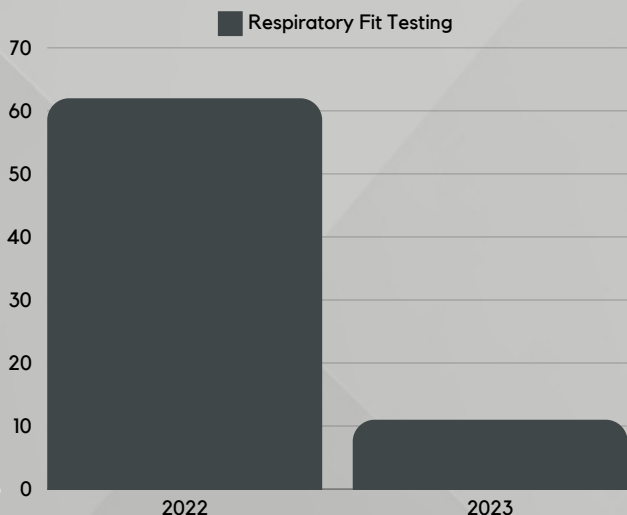

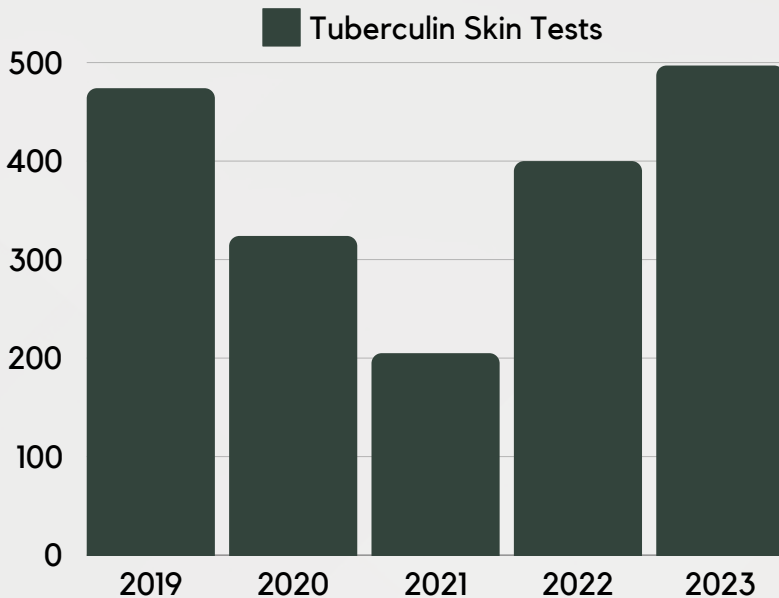
A Year-Over-Year Analysis of Respiratory Fit Testing Performed

With the expansion of our public health laboratory, we have significantly enhanced our service offerings to include biometric screenings. In 2022, we successfully organized and executed our first-ever biometric screening event tailored to the City of Osawatomie.

Building on this success and newfound partnership, we proudly hosted another screening event for the City of Osawatomie and another to Miami County in the fall of 2023.

Tuberculin Skin Tests (TST) are a cornerstone of tuberculosis (TB) control efforts. Playing a critical role in early detection, prevention, and management of tuberculosis infection and disease.

In 2023, with the signing of several memorandums of understanding (MOU), MCHD has administered pre-employment TSTs to individuals who work in high-risk settings.

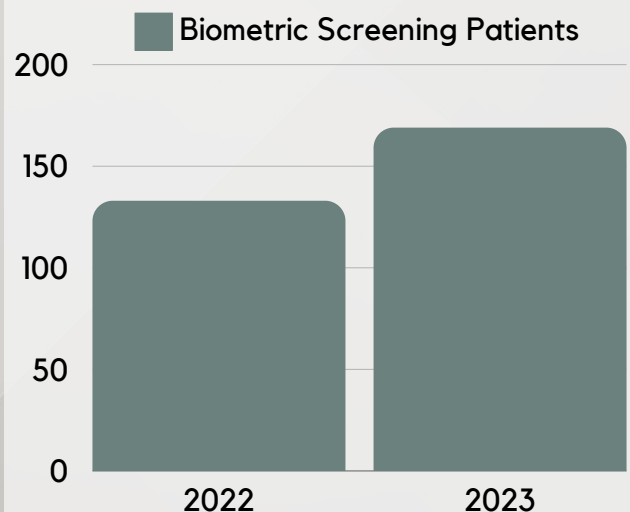

A Year-Over-Year Analysis of Biometric Screenings Performed



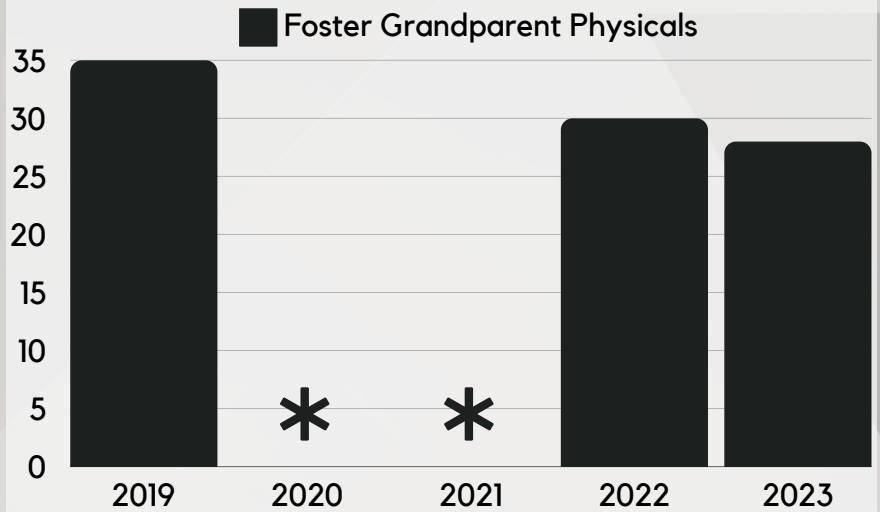

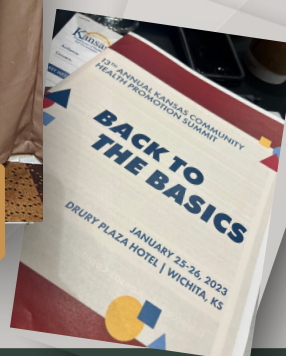

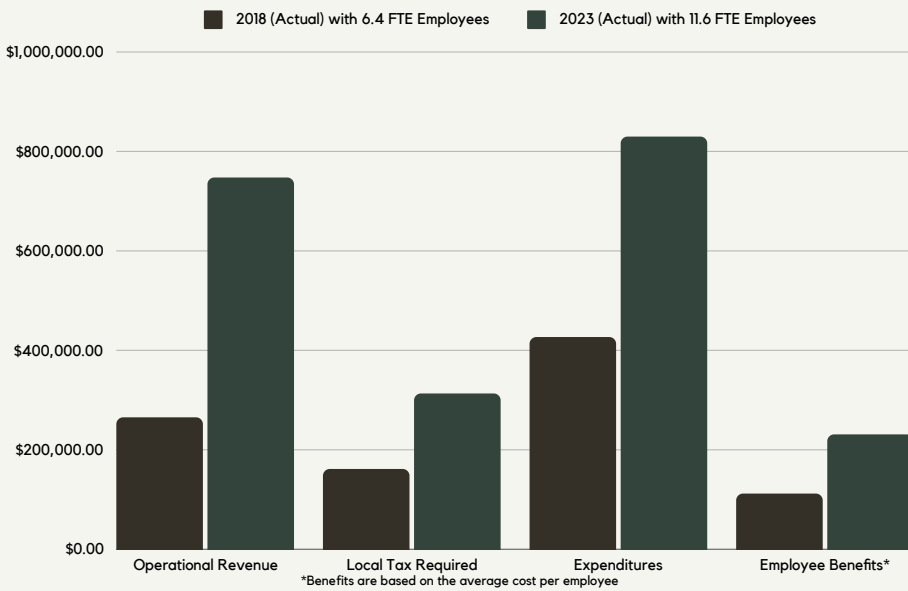

In 2023, MCHD actively pursued and secured additional grant funding to sustain programs, support staff, and advance work with community partners.

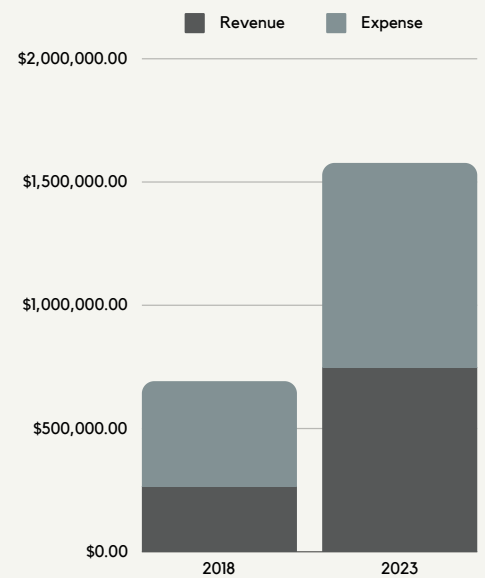

MCHD 6-Year Comparison Financial Overview (Pre-Pandemic & Post-Pandemic)

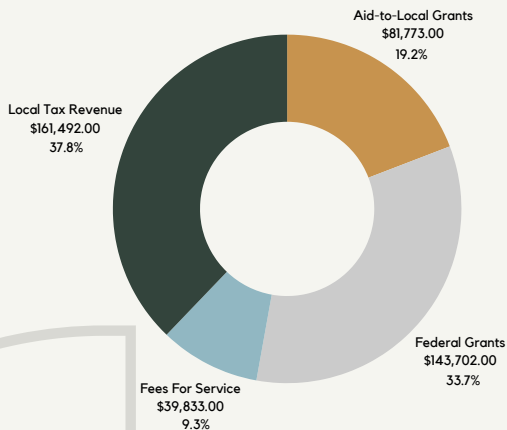
Revenue and Expenditures



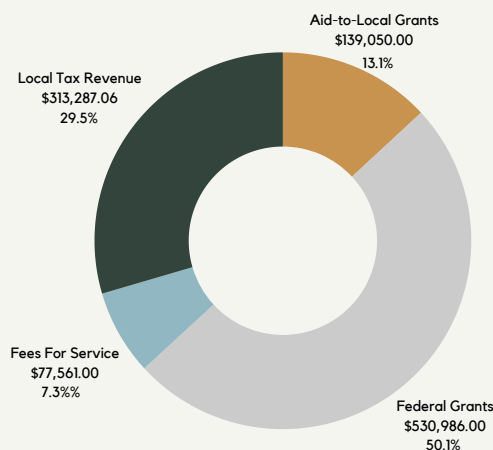

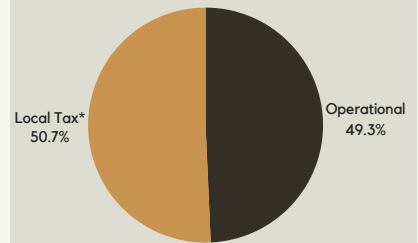
2018 Departmental Revenue Received



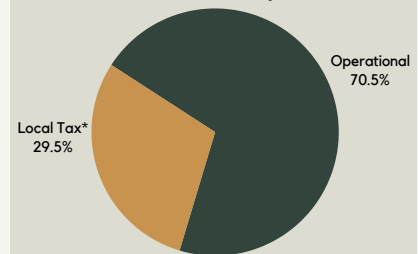
2023 Departmental Revenue Received
